began with a delicious breakfast

cooked and served by the Top of the Lake Communities Association. Unfortunately, they ran out of food, but our local Cove Bar serves a great breakfast, so people were able to go there. This is definitely a community event.

The Ride began at 11:00 with 225 snowmobiles running and ready to take off on the 13 mile (one way) ride to the Cranberry Lodge. We do want to let the Hiawatha Sportsman's Club know how much we appreciate them letting us use their property for this fun event!

The weather pulled a fast one on us Tuesday night and Wednesday with rain. Luckily, the Curtis and Hiawatha Club groomers did a fantastic job on the trails, making them much better than expected. #### 2023 Rear Engine Ride #8

#### 800 Miles and Still Riding 2023 by John McGuirk

The rear engine riders returned again this year for their eighth year of riding the rear engine antique machines for a total of 100 miles over a total of three days prior to the Museum's annual winter show and ride. The goal of riding 1,000 miles is getting closer!

The group numbered 24 pusher machines including Polaris, Arctic Cat, Eliason , Snow Bug, Autoboggan, Boatel and Bosak. Mike Siler

rode his 1958 Polaris prototype, and Allen Jewell rode a 1963 Bosak Super M 300 powered by a Volkswagen engine. Barrie Graham wasn't to be outdone riding his Eliason K-12. With the Canadian borders reopened we were glad to have our Canadian friends able to return for the ride.

On the first day out the group appeared to be in a contest to see who could break the most stuff. Many repairs were made and everyone got home okay. Rain hit the second day and the group had just as much fun working in Charlie's barn making repairs. Day three turned out really great with some alternate trail riding and we had very few minor stops for repairs.

The group is already looking forward for their next 100 miles in 2024.

60's Fox Trac Snowmobile donated by Wendy Tuttle



At the 2021 Ogemaw Hills Ride and Show, a lady asked if the Museum would like a late 60's Fox Trac as a donation. But she said there was a catch. She would like to have a shop class restore it in memory of her late husband, Bill Tuttle. He had helped train kids in automotive careers. Gene Pierce, from the Tuscola Intermediate School District, offered to have their shop class restore the sled. After a fresh makeover, one of our board members picked it up, and it looks like new. It will be used as a fundraiser for the Museum's Fall 2023 Raffle. Thank you, Wendy Tuttle for donating it in Bill's name. And thank you to everyone who helped restore it, so it can live on.

#### Finland Represented



January, 2023. We had two men from Finland here and they were impressed with the FinnCat that is on display. These guys work for the John Deere logging equipment department and did not have snowmobiles but were very interested in the FinnCat. This machine was one of the 33 snowmobiles donated by the Bombardier Museum in Valcourt, Quebec in 2015.

The Finncat was first produced in 1978 in Uleaborg, Finland after five years of testing by the inventor Jorma Pohjola. It has a unique steering system. The track is made from 13 pieces of stretchable plastic and will stretch like an accordion in the

front on the opposite side of the turn, which will allow more lift on the exterior side of the turn, which pulls the vehicle in the other direction. Only about 10 units were made in 1979 & 80 in a cooperation with Aktiv in Sweden, a producer of snowmobiles. The cooperation was discontinued due to quality problems.

This Finncat is powered by a Rotax 2 stroke, 2 cyl. 496cc engine with electric start. Other engines included Arctic Spirit (Suzuki) & Hirth. It weighs 595 lbs. It has a motorcycle type throttle and a transmission with 2 speeds forward, neutral and reverse.

#### Engadine Consolidated Preschool Class, Feb 22, 2023

It was another eventful day at the Museum. The Engadine Preschool class was here to learn about and experience snowmobiles. They arrived at 9:15 on the school bus, had a quick lesson on snowmobiling ethics, a tour through the Museum and then they took off for the actual experience. They rode in sleighs with our staff and parents driving the sleds. The Curtis Groomers went through the night before so the trails were awesome. When the kids returned, they had lunch, and then headed back to the Engadine School to complete their day. I bet they slept well that night!



#### 1964 SKI-DOO RD8

The story of this snowmobile is one for the books, it starts off in the snowy parts of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Its restoration journey began when my dear friend, Ron Durepo, discovered this gem stored behind a vacated building during one of his many up north snowmobile trips. Ron always had a good eye for potential with snow machines. With him being a self-proclaimed "Ski-Doo Historian", he was able to smooth talk the owner of the RD8 in to letting him buy it with plans to restore.

Ron slowly realized he did not have the time for the lengthy restoration. Putting the restoration on hold, Ron was forced to sell this treasure and abandon his dreams of a full restoration. It was sold to a local man in Owosso with the hopes that he would fully restore the snow machine. Fast forward several years later...

At breakfast, before attending the A1 Snowmobile Swap meet, we were at a table full of snow buds chatting about restoration projects that have yet to be completed. John, from Ohio, spoke of the numerous Ski-doo's he had to restore and how he needed to offload a few. He talked about a RD8 he had in original condition, needing restoration, but didn't have the time to begin the process. This got Ron very excited. Ron posed numerous questions and was amazed at how similar this snow machine replicated the one he sold.

Ron asked, who did you purchase this RD8 from? John stated he bought it off a man from Owosso. At that moment you could see Ron's face light up with joy! You guessed it, this was the original RD8 that he sold years back and it had come full circle. Ron jumped at the chance to purchase this RD8 back into his possession. He lovingly restored this beauty to its original glory and that is what you see here today.

#### Clarkson University SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge, 2023

The SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge is a yearly snowmobile event where Collegiate teams build and modify existing snowmobiles and compete in multiple events based on improvements in emissions and performance.

The first SAE Clean Challenge was held in 2000 at Jackson Hole, WY. The event moved to Michigan Tech University, Houghton, MI, in 2003. In 2006, a new category of "Zero Remissions" was added, supporting the need for engineering support for snowmachine vehicles in pristine areas. In 2007, another category, "Bio-Fuels" was added. In 2009, the category for "Flex Fuel" was added. In 2022, the competition was moved to the World Championship Derby Headquarters in Eagle River, WI.

The group of students from Clarkson University in Upper New York returned again this year on their way to the Clean Snowmobile Challenge at the Eagle River Derby in Eagle River, WI with their Caterpillar C1.1 diesel sled. They also stopped on their way home to inform us that they were #1 in the Diesel category again this year! They won the Best Overall CI Class, Best Design paper, Best Fuel, Best Emissions and Best Handling. Way to go guys!!

It was such an honor to meet and talk with such a great group of students!

**B**oa Skis for 1971 were made by Giffen Recreational Limited, based in Montreal and an office in Florida. In 1971, Boa Ski entered the race circuit with this racer, nicknamed the Coffin Racer (because of the seat) and only 30 were made. There are only three known to be left.

Gary Bogenschutz had his Coffin racer

in the Museum and sold it to Marco Vachon, from Canada. Last September Marco came to pick it up. Marco knew the man who was a major part of building this machine, Lincoln Custeau. Luckily, Marco was able to get a picture of Lincoln sitting on this snowmobile before he passed away

the first part of March, 2023.

#### **Snowmobile the Mighty Mac**

The excitement was evident as they were pacing, checking out the wheel kits on the other machines, and talking with the other drivers. About 20 of those drivers were new to this event, which is what we love to see! Charlie Vallier and Greg Busch, from the Top of the Lake Snowmobile Museum, gathered everyone together for a driver's meeting a few minutes before the 11:00 am take-off. After that, everyone sang the National Anthem. Virgil Morell's sled with a flag attached was the center of attention. This was a new part of the event this year and will be continued from now on. We even had a woman in the group offer to lead the group with the singing next year. (I don't think Greg will mind giving that up.) Then it was time to head out from under the Bridge to the top for the 5 mile ride.

This event is sponsored by the Museum, the St. Ignace Visitor's Bureau, and the Mackinac Bridge Authority, which we want to give a huge thank you to for letting us use the Bridge for this special event. This was our 7<sup>th</sup> year and this time there were only 2 breakdowns. The Bridge Authority follows the sleds with a trailer, nicknamed by the group as the Trailer of Shame. We did notice a couple flat tires at the end of the ride, but they made it all the way across. It started to snow as the sleds were about halfway across. By the time they reached the toll booths on the north side, we couldn't see the towers because of the snow.

The next Snowmobile the Mighty Mac will be Saturday, Dec 9, 2023. Snowmobiles which must be a minimum of 25 years old and have front wheel kits that have a minimum 2" wide wheels and no studs or cleats, will be allowed to drive over the Bridge under their own power. They also will need a current permit or a Michigan Historic Registration sticker. The driver must be at least 12, with a Youth Snowmobile Safety Class Certificate. Passengers are allowed for an extra fee. The cost to drive over the bridge is \$40, which includes the cost of lunch and all other fees involved.
