3rd Annual Snowmobile the Mighty Mac – Dec 15, 2018

The Top of the Lake Snowmobile Museum, in conjunction with The St. Ignace Visitors Bureau, is again offering a unique experience for snowmobile enthusiasts. On December 15, antique and vintage snowmobiles will be allowed to drive over the Mackinac Bridge under their own power. ***The sleds must be a minimum of 25 years old, have front wheel kits that have a minimum 2" wide wheels, and no cleats or studs. Sleds also must have a Historic or regular registration.***

The cost to drive over the Bridge is \$35 for each person, and includes lunch at the St. Ignace Little Bear East Arena, sled Bridge fare, and Bridge Authority expenses. There is an additional \$30 fee for a passenger.

Machines will line up at the Colonial Michilimackinac parking lot in Mackinaw City (under the Bridge.) **You must have your sled unloaded by 10 am** so you can drive to the North side Welcome Center where a bus will drive everyone back across to your sled. **The drive over the Bridge will begin at 11:00.**

If someone is travelling with you, but not crossing the Bridge, you may want to have him or her take your vehicle and trailer to the ending location, the Welcome Center, just past the St. Ignace toll booths on the East side of the road. If not, we will have a shuttle available. To utilize the shuttle service, drop your machine off at the park in Mackinaw City and drive your vehicle/trailer across the Bridge to the Welcome Center. At **10:15 am**, a school bus will leave the Welcome Center and head back to the Colonial Michilimackinac park where the machines and event organizers are located.

After crossing the Bridge, load your machines onto your trailers in the Welcome Center parking lot and drive your vehicle to the Little Bear East Arena, in downtown St. Ignace. Lunch will be served at approximately 1 pm. Lunch can be purchased separately for \$10 for anyone who didn't drive a snowmobile across the Bridge. If you ordered a commemorative shirt, it will be available for \$15. Awards will be handed out and we hope you have a great time!

During the show Brad Hulings (Hall of Fame Snowmobile Racer), who was rumored to have raced on a Gorski, was contacted by text and confirmed that he did race a 1975 Gorski and won every 440 mod race he entered, including the Eastern Championship. He said that the Gorski was the first factory team that he raced for.

Dan Cunningham and the entire Honda East group are to be commended for another excellent show which seems to get even better every year. Everyone left talking about next year's show and how much fun they had this year.

Plaisted Expedition 50th Anniversary Celebration

April 19, 2018, began as a beautiful day in Duluth, MN. It was much warmer than that day, 50 years ago, when four men rode 1968 Ski Doo snowmobiles and successfully communicated with the Air Force that they were located 90 degrees North, at the North Pole!

A group of 65+ invited friends and family were gathered at the Radisson Hotel to honor the 50th anniversary of this amazing feat. John Moriarty was one the only living Plaisted Expedition team person at this celebration. He was there with memorabilia he had kept (he was determined to go home with his tool box!)

Walt Pederson's two sons and two daughters were in charge of organizing the event (with help from the Aufderheides) and their families were there, too. Bernie and Sue Frank were also in attendance. Bernie was a student in Walt's high school mechanic's class. Walt called Bernie after he graduated to ask if he wanted to go into a dealership business with him a few years before the expedition idea was formed. Bernie helped Walt get the machines ready for the trip. Suzanne Norton, whose father, Andy, was stationed at the Expedition's base camp, attended with her husband.

No matter who we talked to that day, we thoroughly enjoyed the memories and stories! It made the trip so much more real to us who can't imagine doing something that adventurous. We had dinner that night with John Moriarty at the Pickwick Bar & Restaurant in Duluth (where Ralph Plaisted and Art Aufderheide thought this would be a great idea.) John is 78 now, has had a fascinating life and said he would do the trip again (a few years younger, of course.) John was working at the Pillsbury plant when Ralph stopped in to ask for donations for the trip. When John heard the plan, he knew he wanted to join in. He quit his job, contacted Ralph and became a crew member! This day was overwhelming for John, and he enjoyed every moment of it.

He phoned in at 2:00 and all of us were able to listen as Tim Pederson talked to him! This represented the actual call with the Air Force, verifying that the group did make it to 90 degrees North.

The next highlight was the amazing presentation by Walt, Art Aufderheide's son. He expressed the thoughts of all the expedition members and their families so well! Walt also introduced the video presentation for the 50th anniversary which was made by Cindy Pederson Anderson's husband, Garrett, with assistance from their 13 year-old son. It was a powerful video! We were fortunate to get a copy of it from Cindy and we are showing it in our Museum Plaisted Expedition display.

We are sure we will see the Pedersons and Aufderheides again. They are so proud of their fathers and their accomplishments. We want to spread the word about this amazing, historic event that took place 50 years ago!



Sept 16 was the first time we had a bus tour stop! Last summer, Tom Nemacheck from UP Travel (Pure Michigan, UP) stopped in to see if we would be a rest-room/lunch stop for their bus tours! Featured Snowmobile: – 1969 Thunderbolt

This is one of two Thunderbolts ever built and the only one currently assembled with a motor and is operable. The second machine is in North Dakota.

Henry Leseman of Ada, MN did specialized work for Arctic Cat and made parts for many other snowmobile manufacturers. He was encouraged to build his own snowmobile and he did so using the best features of Arctic Cat and Viking along with some ideas of his own. This was the start of Thor Industries and the Thunderbolt snowmobile. Two prototypes were built and tested in the summer of 1969. One Thunderbolt was sent to an East coast distributor to be shown at a show in Montreal, with the intention of encouraging dealers to sell this machine. At the same time, the

company that was committed to the funding backed out since the industry was beginning to struggle. This particular machine was given to the distributor by Henry.

Henry Leseman sold his business and began a company in Venezuela in 1972. Henry sold one of the Thunderbolt's before he left for Venezuela to a man from North Dakota. In 1982, Mr. Errol (Bud) Knapp of Cedar Springs, MI was doing research on the Thunderbolt and met with Henry, who lives in Arkansas. Bud was later able to purchase this Thunderbolt in Dover, New Hampshire.



Mackinac Bridge Tower Tour Certificates



The Mackinac Bridge Authority holds a drawing once per year each August, and randomly chooses 25 non-profit organizations to receive a tower tour certificate to be raffled or auctioned for charitable purposes. The certificates can be used May 1st through October 15th of the following year, and are good for two people.

The **Top of the Lake Snowmobile Museum** was chosen to receive a tower tour certificate. The certificate will be auctioned off at the Top of the Lake Snowmobile Show on February 16, 2019, during the banquet on Saturday night.

Special Museum Visitor

This Museum visitor is Bernie Beaulieu from Sault Ste. Marie. He stopped in on October 18 and discovered this 1961 Polaris SnoTraveler that came here from the Valley Camp Museum in Sault Ste. Marie in 2014. He used to work with this snowmobile! He retired from the Corps of Engineers. They would ride out on the ice of the St. Mary's River every day and work for eight hours. Workers had to measure the depth of the water every day for the ships. There had to be at least 18" of clearance between the ship and the bottom of the river. If not, the river had to be dredged. This snowmobile would haul the equipment and workers out on the ice. They drilled holes and dropped a lead weight down to do the measuring every 50 feet. Up to seven men rode on the runners of this machine. This snowmobile was shipped to Detour to do the same work there. It was only used for two years. Bernie was thrilled to find this machine in the Museum. Bernie was smiling the whole time he was sharing his memories.

2018 St. Ignace Snowmobile/Tractor Show & ASCOA Summer Meeting

The Antique Snowmobile Club of America decided to do something a little different this year and chose to hold their summer meeting in conjunction with the 11th Annual Antique Tractor Crossing of the Mackinac Bridge and the 5th Annual Snowmobile Show on September 7 & 8. This Tractor and Snowmobile Show is exceptional in its own right but adding the Antique Snowmobile Club of America summer meeting brought snowmobile participants from as far away as Pennsylvania to Montana with some very unique and special snowmobiles.

The snowmobiles were once again given a place of honor inside the arena for the week-end. The arena came alive on Friday morning as the parade of 1342 antique tractors, which made the Mackinac Bridge crossing, assembled in the parking lot of the arena. Both Tractor participants and Snowmobile folks appreciated the opportunity to mingle and share their common history and love of old machinery. The Antique Club members began the reassembly of a 1963 Matthews Trailmaker in the arena which they intend to sell raffle tickets over the next 17 months. ASCOA held their Friday Night Cracker Barrel in the arena and the Museum did their part by hosting this event and providing the snacks and refreshments. The get together provided the ASCOA members with an opportunity to rekindle friendships, make a few new ones, and to share a few tall tales.

Saturday was a very busy day starting with the ASCOA membership meeting at the Kewadin Casino, continued reassembly of a 1963 Matthews Trailmaker, and a day of greeting visitors and answering questions about antique and vintage snowmobiles in the arena. The Antique members all chipped in at the end of the day to make sure everyone's sleds were loaded and secured for their trip home.

That evening the Casino staff put on a delicious buffet in the banquet room for the snowmobilers. This was followed by the presentation of awards sponsored by the Museum and St. Ignace Visitor's Bureau. Awards were given out with the John Hayes' Ford Model A receiving the People's Choice. John McGuirk received the James Nadler Memorial award in memory of his late friend, James. James attended all of our shows from the very beginning in 2014 and was a avid supporter.

Ted Postula then did a superb job of coaxing the ASCOA members to part with their money, raising an amazing \$3200 for their club. Not to toot his own horn, but a highlight of the auction, after intense bidding, was the purchase and presentation of a brass 1920's era car horn by Randy McEwen to our own Charlie Vallier!

MCACA & NEA awards the Museum with an Operational Support Grant

The Top of the Lake Snowmobile Museum has been awarded a grant of \$12,500.00 for Operational Support from the Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs (MCACA) and the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA – ART WORKS). The grant was awarded through the MCACA peer review process and was one of approximately 310 applications to compete for the Operational Support Grants by MCACA for the fiscal year 2019 funding.

The grant is for Operational Support for costs associated with the operation of the Museum. It requires a 1:1 match and will help the Museum to leverage \$12,500.00 of support from its annual income and the many donations received from supporters. In particular the Museum has received grants from the Graymont Community Economic Development Fund and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians. It has also received significant donations from the Antique Snowmobile Club of America, The Midwest Vintage Snowmobile Shows, Inc. (Waconia), many snowmobile clubs, its internal \$1,000 Challenge program and many Museum members.

The MCACA peer review process allows for each grant application to be competitively considered by a panel of in-state and out-of-state arts and culture professionals. This ensures the taxpayers, who support this project through legislative appropriations, and all other visitors or residents in Michigan will have access to the highest quality arts and cultural experiences.

Museum Receives Grant Monies:

In June the Museum received notices of two grants, which will be used for the I-500 display. The Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians awarded \$2000 for the display and the Graymont Foundation awarded \$5000 from their yearly distribution of community grant donations. All of us at the Museum are very appreciative of this outstanding contribution to the success of the Museum!
